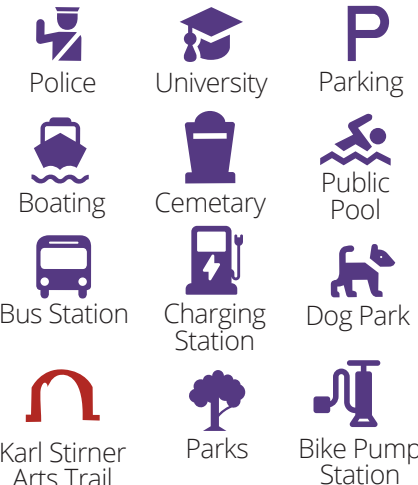

Explore History

Want to experience historic Easton? Take our annual house tour (eastonhousetour.com), visit the Sigal Museum (sigalmuseum.org), and ride our charming trolley (eastontrolley.com/historic-tour). We add new tours often.

- Centre Square**
Centre Square is actually a circle—and it's the heart of our city, historically and today. Its 75-foot monument pays tribute to all who served in the military. During the holidays, it's transformed into the world's tallest Peace Candle.
- Easton Public Library | 515 Church Street**
Originally the Easton Library Company, it was established in 1811 with 700 titles. By 1895, the Easton Public Library was formed and a new building rose with funds donated by Andrew Carnegie in 1902.
- The Jacob Nicholas House | 5th & Ferry Street**
One of the few remaining Easton buildings from the Federal Period, the house is named for Jacob Nicholas, a wood turner and later, the owner and captain of a Durham boat.
- The Parsons-Taylor House | 4th & Ferry Street**
Built in 1757 for surveyor general William Parsons, this house is one of the oldest buildings in the city and an outstanding example of colonial architecture. George Taylor, a signer of the Declaration of Independence, took up residence here in 1780.
- St. John's Church | 330 Ferry Street**
Founded in 1740 by German Lutherans, services were originally held in a log school house. A grave cellar lies beneath the church, the burial site of many important Eastonians. Visitors can view the cellar during July's Easton Heritage Day.
- Karl Stirner Arts Building | 230 Ferry Street**
Often credited with revitalizing the city's arts scene, international sculptor Karl Stirner (1923–2016) moved to Easton in 1983 and purchased this building. Today Easton boasts numerous galleries and dozens of nationally recognized artists call it home.
- Phoenix Volunteer Fire Company | 219 Ferry Street**
A volunteer fire company was housed here beginning in 1858. By 1989, now owned by the U.S. Post Office and in complete disrepair, an agreement was reached with the city to preserve the historic Phoenix building.
- Bachmann Publick House | 169 Northampton Street**
Built in 1753 by Jacob and Katrina Bachmann, the house has served as a tavern, courtroom, grocer, and residence for George Taylor. Famous visitors include John Adams and Ben Franklin. Today, it houses the Lenape Cultural Center.
- The Governor Wolf Building | 42 N. 2nd Street**
Built in 1893, this stunning building served as Easton's first high school and is named after the seventh Governor of Pennsylvania, George Wolf of Easton, who founded the Pennsylvania Free Public School System. The stone entry is called the Penny Arch because its construction was made possible by schoolchildren's penny donations.
- Florence Seibert House | 73 N. 2nd Street**
An inductee into the National Women's Hall of Fame, Florence Seibert was handicapped by polio at age three, graduated valedictorian at Easton High School, and became a distinguished biochemist, studying intravenous therapy and diseases. In 1934, she developed a TB test which was eventually adopted worldwide.
- Millionaire's Row | N. 3rd Street**
During the Industrial Revolution, Easton was the wealthiest town in the region and this section of Third Street was known as Millionaire's Row from the mid 1800s through the early 20th century.
- First United Church of Christ | 229 Church Street**
The church and the courthouse played a prominent role in the American Revolution, serving as hospitals for wounded and infirm soldiers. George Washington is said to have visited soldiers in here during a visit to Easton.

Attractions

Easton offers an abundance of interesting and exciting things to see and do—for visitors of all ages.

- The State Theater | 453 Northampton Street**
From its 1910 vaudeville house roots to its current incarnation as "The State," this historic theater is a downtown Easton institution. Non-profit and member supported, the venue presents a diverse lineup of entertainment and performing arts. www.statetheatre.org
- Easton Public Market | 325 Northampton Street**
Shop, cook, dine, imbibe! This community-supported market features artisanal food vendors, a farm stand, tasty events at the demonstration kitchen, and unique presentations and workshops in the community room. | eastonpublicmarket.com
- The Crayola Experience | 30 Centre Square**
With over 425,000 visitors annually, the Crayola Experience is one of Easton's most popular destinations. Explore four floors of 28 hands-on, creative attractions and live entertainment, and watch how crayons are made. | crayolaexperience.com/easton
- Easton Farmers' Market | 325 Northampton Street**
America's oldest, continuous, open-air market, EFM was established in 1752, the year of the city's founding. EFM remains a vibrant community gathering space, featuring more than 35 local growers, bakers and makers, and a dozen festivals and events throughout the season. eastonfarmersmarket.com
- The Simon Silk Mill | 601-659 N. 13th Street**
Built in 1883 along the Bushkill Creek, the former R&H Simon Silk Mill is undergoing a stunning transformation. Redevelopment of the Mill includes 160 live/work apartments for resident artists as well as space for numerous small businesses.
- National Canal Museum | 2750 Hugh Moore Park Road**
In beautiful Hugh Moore Park, the Museum interprets the history and culture of canals as well as the science and technology behind their building. Harness a mule, steer a canal boat, and engage in activities to learn how canals were built. | canals.org
- Canal Boat Ride | 2750 Hugh Moore Park Road**
Hank and George, our canal boat mules, tow the Josiah White II through the waters of the Lehigh Canal while the crew interprets the story of the anthracite canals and the people who worked and lived on them. canals.org/visit/ride-the-canal-boat
- Nature Nurture Center | 518 Northampton Street**
A dynamic center for community learning about local environmental issues, NNC hosts a variety of science and art programs. Don't miss Science on a Sphere®, a 6-foot globe showcasing hundreds of breathtaking visualizations of earth and space science. | nurturenaturecenter.org
- The Sigal Museum | 342 Northampton Street**
A leading institution of local history, the Sigal is home to pre-European settlement artifacts, decorative arts and textiles, farming implements and colonial furniture. Enjoy interactive exhibits, tours, children's programs, and a lecture series on local and American history. | sigalmuseum.org

Get Outside

Visit Easton's scenic parks or use the city as a starting point to expand your adventures. Explore bucolic trails and our mighty rivers. Enjoy breathtaking views along the way—and art too!

- Karl Stirner Arts Trail**
Within walking distance of both Lafayette College and the downtown area, the KSAT follows the bucolic Bushkill Creek for 1.75 miles. Named for Easton sculptor Karl Stirner, the trail features 15+ stunning pieces by contemporary artists along with the Young Masters Wall, showcasing the works of young artists, often local students. Includes a dog park. karlstirnerartstrail.org
- Two Rivers Trailway**
Explore 30 miles of walking, hiking & biking paths and visit multiple parks in Northampton County along the way—from Penn Pump Park in Palmer Township to Bushkill Park in Forks Township. Find an access point by going to tworiverstrailway.com
- Delaware & Lehigh Trail**
The Delaware & Lehigh National Heritage Corridor (D&L) is a multi-use trail spanning 165 miles from the mountains of northeast Pennsylvania through the Lehigh Valley and Bucks County. Access the trail in downtown Easton by heading across the Lehigh River at 3rd and Larry Holmes Drive. Continue around the corner, bearing left (following Route 611). The trail entrance is on the left. | delawareandlehigh.org/map
- Hugh Moore Park**
A 250-acre picturesque extension of the city of Easton, nestled between the Lehigh Canal and Lehigh River, Hugh Moore features access to the 165 mile D&L trail, bike and boat rentals, two pavilions, a recently renovated playground, and a brand new biking skills course. Plus rides on Pennsylvania's only mule-drawn canal boat! | canals.org



EASTON NEIGHBORHOODS

- College Hill**
This historic neighborhood, overlooking downtown Easton, is home to Lafayette College, and Gollub and Nevin Parks. It features a mix of architectural styles and includes grand mansions, with most homes built between 1830 and 1940.
- Downtown**
Our walkable downtown is the place to be. Easton boasts 30+ eateries, America's oldest open-air farmers' market and festivals year-round. Soak up history in our riverfront city, enjoy Broadway-style shows at The State Theatre, and explore our many attractions.
- South Side**
Designed by the Lehigh Coal and Navigation company in 1833, the borough of South Easton was designed with canal and railroad workers in mind. With affordable housing for middle income families, its close proximity to I-78 makes it a convenient gateway to Easton.
- West Ward**
A convenient, walkable community made up of many smaller neighborhoods, the West Ward features historic architecture and a funky, creative atmosphere. Stroll to micro-brew pubs, award-winning community gardens, the beautiful Easton Cemetery, and the Karl Stirner Arts Trail.

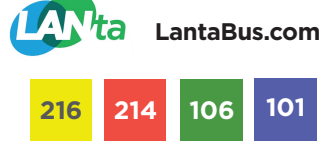
